IGNITING INDEPENDENCE. BUILDING COMMUNITY.

As we near the end of winter, it seems to be the best time of the year to have a few moments of reflection. Many of you know that the Ranch changed its mission statement some time ago, focusing on the Ranch's desire to ensure that opportunities are available for Ranchers to lead meaningful lives of their own choosing. Since that point, the vision of the organization has shifted to focus even more on a self-directed quality of life for the people that call the Ranch home, while also ensuring the unique country environment is utilized and appreciated.

Recently, it was decided to also update the tagline to reflect the same important philosophies that are reflected in DHR's mission and vision. Luckily, we had some help from our friends at Charles Schwab who donated their professional services to ensure we came up with just the right amount words to tell our story in a short, easy-to-remember phrase.

We began by identifying the qualities of DHR that are admired most by Ranchers. After coming up with a list two pages long, we boiled it down to three main traits: freedom to move around the Ranch, preference for a rural lifestyle and doing activities of interest.

Each of these qualities are part of everyday life at the Ranch, and clearly reinforce an organizational belief that people should have access to new experiences that may develop into an interest. These interests might then become a hobby or passion, which opens the door to many kinds of community. Staying true to the essences of what makes Down Home Ranch unique, Ranchers have the opportunity to be lifelong learners, over time growing into better versions of themselves and learning along the way from both failure and success.

Community can be a physical location or a group of people who share common goals or interests. Community can't just be thought of as where a person lays their head at night. It's also how their day is spent. The Ranch works to promote as much choice and independence as possible to ensure Ranchers are able to access their chosen communities. Being physically present in a community encourages diversity, but the magic happens when relationships are formed.



THE KEYS TO OPPORTUNITY By Casey Dickerson, Director of Client Services

For many years, the Ranch has provided a home to people with IDD. In 2017, we realized that we could improve our services by increasing the number of options we have available. In addition to the HCS houses in town and the ICF houses on the Ranch, we acquired 3 micro-homes that would each be a home to one Rancher living with increased independence.

Many Ranchers prefer to live on the Ranch because of the access it gives them to their community here. They enjoy the use of the Ranch's buildings and resources as well as the ability to walk and visit with friends.

Adding the micro-homes as a residential option allowed for people to keep their choice of living on the Ranch while giving them more space and independence.

Part of what makes this program work is moving from the live-in staff model to the Supported Home Living (SHL) model. Supported Home Living is a program in which the staff provides assistance only in the areas that the Rancher needs. This could include assisting with meals, monitoring medication and aiding in the upkeep of the home. SHL helps to ensure that Ranchers can have their needs met while maintaining their own home.

DHR has now added three more microhomes, bringing our total up to six! We are excited to be able to offer the opportunity for growth to three more individuals this year.

HOME SWEET HOME

The dream of having a home you can call your own is shared by people all over the world. In 2019, this lifelong dream finally came true for Mark. For the past two months, Mark has been patiently awaiting the arrival of his very own micro home. Every day he would inquire about his new home, giggling with joy when talking about all of the plans he has for it.

Being a true independent soul, Mark is most looking forward to having his own uninterrupted space where he can choose to be alone or have company, a luxury you can't experience with roommates. Mark has big plans for his space, stating he wants to "take care of it, keep it clean, keep the dishes washed and make dinner every night!" His new space also provides a personal parking spot and plenty of space to take care of his red-eared slider turtles. Planning ahead, he has even invited a few friends over for morning coffee!

While he has always considered himself an independent soul, this new life accomplishment truly brings it all home. When asked how getting his own micro home makes him feel, with a joyful grin on his face, he replied "It makes me feel GOOD!"





HOT OFF THE PRESS!

Each quarter Ranchers are given a variety of different classes, however there's one class that has been a fan favorite for quite some time. Rancher Monthly allows Ranchers to see their passions and creativity displayed for all to see. Weekly, Ranchers gather together to give updates on anything exciting that is happening in their lives. From weekend activities to how many eggs were in the chicken coop, everything that a Rancher wants to share is welcome and accepted by those involved in the Rancher Monthly. Every month the Rancher Monthly is printed and given out to each Rancher and a digital copy is sent to staff and families. Those who have written an article for the Rancher Monthly beam with pride each time they see what they wrote in the hands of others. It is clear to see why these ranchers love this class so much!













INNKEEPERS TEAM

One of the vocational arms of Down Home Ranch is the Innkeepers team. There are eight Ranchers on the team and they are responsible for cleaning and maintaining all locations on the Ranch, including our rental properties! Every week, Innkeepers visit each building and thoroughly clean the area, ensuring nothing is missed. They are also responsible for stocking each location with supplies such as paper towels, toilet paper and trash bags. The Innkeepers program gives the Ranchers an opportunity to maintain steady employment while being a part of the day-to-day operations on the Ranch. They always know they are successful when someone says, "Wow! It looks so nice in here!"



BEAUTIFYING OUR COMMUNITY

Through the Elgin Beautification Program, Ranchers have enjoyed donating their time and talents to improving the community where they live. The idea for this program came from the Elgin Chamber of Commerce back in 2018 when there was a need for volunteers to spruce up their flower beds. Since the Ranchers are known as superior horticulturists, the word got around to Down Home Ranch and we jumped at the opportunity! Greenhouses Get Revamped

A summer storm brought hail damage all across the Ranch, with one of the major impact areas being the greenhouses. Fortunately, our insurance covered the repairs and the roofs were replaced quickly enough that no large losses were suffered by the plants.

We have continued making renovations to the greenhouses ever since. A few of the upgrades include new heaters, framing for the hoop houses and completing an electrical safety assessment. An investment in the greenhouses is an investment in the educational and vocational training that takes place in each of them, as well as paid job opportunities for Ranchers employed in the DHR Gardens. In the end, every plant sold out of a Ranch greenhouse equates to an increase in quality of life for someone we serve.



Paving the Way for Safe Travels

From bikes and golf carts to semi-trucks and trailers, many tires touch DHR roads every day. Between Ranchers, staff, volunteers, visitors, delivery drivers and new friends, the Ranch has over 100 people use the roads each and every day, with some days even doubling that.

Just the daily traffic was wreaking havoc on the roads, creating potholes and cracks. We are proud to announce that new life was given to a portion of the DHR roads in November 2019!



Have You Seen Our New Ride?

Back in 2018, we partnered with our friends at Williamson County Equipment in Taylor to apply for a grant from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's Texas Emissions Reduction Plan program. This program aims to replace older vehicles and equipment that have a negative impact on the climate.

In 2019, we were officially awarded a \$39,000 grant to help purchase a new tractor and dispose of our old one. Since then, the tractor has helped us complete major utility repairs across the Ranch, spread granite across all areas of the DHR Memorial Garden, cleared pasture fence lines for the cattle herd and more. What would have required hundreds of staff and volunteer hours was able to be completed much faster thanks to this new piece of equipment.





LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, CRAIG RUSSELL

I recently spent some time reflecting on my life and the choices I made that led me where I am today. I realize that who I am is a result of many decisions made over the years. They impact how I see the world and interact with it. I wondered what my life would be like if I wasn't the one making the decisions. Who would I be? How would I be different?

I find that too often people with IDD are not encouraged to make decisions for themselves. It may be easier to just tell them what to do, but how does that affect who they are as a person? What experiences are they missing out on in life?

At Down Home Ranch, it is an important part of our culture to ensure that we are providing opportunities for the people we serve and then empowering them to make the decisions. Our new tagline, "Igniting Independence. Building Community." communicates our desire for the Ranchers. The DHR Ranchers have the opportunity to participate in programs and employment on and off the Ranch. Their ability to make decisions will result in greater independence and let them explore community in a way the best suites their desires.

We have six micro-houses on the Ranch that provide a high level of independence. The residents of these homes are learning about the challenges of running your own house. They manage food in their refrigerators, call in maintenance issues and invite friends over for coffee.

Down Home Ranch has many moving parts that need to be managed for success. It is because of the generosity of our supporters and the commitment of our staff that we are able to provide a high quality of life for the people we serve. I am very grateful for everyone that is a part of this amazing place.
